

Child Sexual Abuse & Sexual Assault of a Minor

MARYLAND DEFINITIONS

- Child Sexual Abuse: Sexual molestation or exploitation of a minor, whether physical injuries were sustained or not, by a parent or other person who has permanent or temporary care or custody or responsibility for the supervision of a minor, or by any other household or family member.²
- Sexual Assault of a Minor: Sexual assault of a child (age 0-17) that does not fall under the "care or custody" or familial or household requirements of child sexual abuse.

PREVALENCE IN THE UNITED STATES

- Approximately 67% of all sexual assaults reported to police involved persons 0-17.3
- About 1 in 5 girls and 1 in 20 boys will be sexually abused before they turn 18.4
- About 1 in 10 children will be sexually abused before their 18th birthday.⁵
- Data collected in 2008, 2011, and 2014, from a national sample of youth (ages 0-17), showed that 76.7% of males and 70.4% of females reported experiencing sexual assault or abuse at the hands of another adolescent.
- Child sexual abuse is significantly underreported.⁶
 - o 73% of child survivors do not tell anyone about the abuse for at least a year.
 - 45% of victims do not tell anyone for at least 5 years.
 - Data collected in 2008, 2011, and 2014, from a national sample of adolescents (ages 10-17) who experienced sexual assault or abuse, showed that only 31% of adolescents reported their victimization to parents, 33.7% reported to other adults, and 19.1% reported to law enforcement.⁷
 - Some children never disclose.

PREVALENCE IN MARYLAND

- In Maryland, during 2021, there were 6,303 child victims of child maltreatment, in general, although victims of child sexual abuse were included in this number.8
- More specifically, in 2021, there were 2,066 cases of investigated child sexual abuse in Maryland alone⁹ – an increase from the 2,059 Maryland child sexual abuse cases investigated in 2020. 10
- It is important to note that the annual number of cases of investigated child sexual abuse in Maryland may be higher because data typically excludes sexual assaults of children by strangers or others who do not have custody or supervision of a child. 11

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PERPETRATORS

- About 90% of those that sexually abuse a child are acquaintances of either the child or the family, while roughly 10% of sexual abuse is perpetrated by a stranger. 12
- 35% of child sexual abuse is perpetrated by juveniles. In fact, about 12.5% of sexual abuse is perpetrated by youth under the age of 12.13
- The younger the child victim, the more likely it is that the perpetrator is a juvenile themselves. Juveniles are the offenders in 43% of assaults on children under age six. 14

CONSEQUENCES

- Studies have found associations between childhood sexual abuse and schizophrenia, post-traumatic stress disorder, and substance misuse.15
- Teenage pregnancy risk is strongly linked to sexual abuse. 16
